MINUTES OF MIDWAY TOWN COUNCIL PLANNING WORKSHOP HELD ON SATURDAY, MARCH 1, 2014 AT 8:00 A.M. IN THE CONFERENCE ROOM AT FAITH MISSIONARY ALLIANCE CHURCH LOCATED AT 1078 GUMTREE ROAD IN MIDWAY, NORTH CAROLINA.

TOWN COUNCIL PLANNING WORKSHOP

The purpose of the Town Council Planning Workshop is for Town Council to receive planning matters from Town staff on current and future planning matters and for Town Council to provide feedback to staff. The information gathered at the workshop will be used as guidelines for preparation of the 2014-2015 budget.

Street Lights: Town Council was in favor of lighting the major thoroughfares (intersections) as proposed and approved funding in the amount of \$26,000 to be included in the proposed budget for FY 2014-2015.

Contract with Davidson County Sheriff's Department: Regarding the question of contracting with the Davidson County Sheriff's Department to have two deputies assigned to specifically serve the Town, Councilor Todd Nifong questioned what the Town would be getting for that.

Website: Cost of maintaining, updating and hosting of website. Beacon Technologies charges fee of \$135 per month for providing those website services twice a month. Rick Zebra Designs has proposed a fee of 75.00 per month for providing those same services.

Resolution in Support of one-quarter cent tax increase: This is a county-wide tax increase proposed by the Davidson County Board of Commissioners that includes funding for construction of the new high school in northern Davidson County.

Decorative signage where Hickory Tree Road dead-ends into Old US Highway 52: A larger sign (approximately 25ft. wide) at that location would be more visible. Approval by NCDOT required. Sign would have to be a "breakaway" sign because of the location.

Roundabouts and Access Break: Mayor Pro Tem Mike McAlpine emphasized the need for the access break, stating he felt the matter should be directed to Benchmark CMR, Inc. and the Planning Board to proceed forward. He also stated the roundabouts will be a major factor in development; however, he would like to see the roundabouts have more branches to go to different properties. In addition, he stated he thought the capital recovery fees needs to be raised. Other: Kimley-Horn will perform the necessary engineering services at a contract price of \$12,500; however, according to NCDOT Division Engineer Pat Ivey, NCDOT could provide the service at no cost to the Town. Surveyor Brad Coe has offered to do any necessary surveying at no cost to the Town.

Planning & Zoning

Mayor Pro Tem Mike McAlpine said he liked having Benchmark's presence in town. Councilor Moon stated that was a good point. It was suggested to possibly have Vagn Hansen of Benchmark CMR, Inc. to attend the Town Council Budget Workshop.

Sewer Extensions – West of New Highway 52 on Hickory Tree Road

Line A:

This line extends from the south connecting to the Davidson County sewer interceptor west of Highway 52 Bypass. It would extend long the creek channel across Eller Road, Fieldstone Drive, Crescent Court, Little Pond Road, and Lori Lane. It would then extend past the end of Dalby Lane along the creek channel entering the right-of-way of David Smith Road just north of Pin Oak Drive. This line would then extend along David Smith Road to Hickory Tree Road where it would provide service to that intersection

and end. The probable project cost opinion of this line is about \$855,860 which covers about 1,700 feet of 12" sewer line and 5,700' of 8" sewer line.

Line B:

This line extends from the north off a line that serves the Old Cypress Drive subdivision. This line would extend up to Hickory Tree Road entering the right-of-way about 200' east of Tara Gail Lane. The line would then extend along Hickory Tree Road east (south) to Hartman Road (or past David Smith Road if Line A is not constructed). The probable project cost opinion of this line would be about <u>\$1,057,290</u> which covers about 2,800 feet of 12" sewer and 8,400 feet of 8"sewer lines.

\$1,835,082.00 total if both lines are run at the same time.

Following discussion, it was the consensus of Council for Councilor Todd Nifong (Chairman of the House Renovations Committee) to contact contractor Frank Thomas to incorporate all the options in his original proposal and refigure the cost of renovating the house. Councilor Nifong will report back to Council on his findings. Other discussion: Phasing out the trees. Two to three acres for walking trails. Show some initiative by beginning some work on the park. Buffer needed. Parking lot at 2% grade.

Mayor Pro Tem Mike McAlpine recommended the Planning Board be directed to begin work on plan for Fred Sink Road and access break. Discussion on filling vacant seats on Planning and Zoning Board. Several names were submitted as potential Board members.

It was the general consensus of Council to identify the following as major priorities:

 - Control of Access Break: Work with the NCDOT to obtain a control of access break across from the exiting US 52 NB ramps to allow for the construction of a new public street.
 - > Securing a committed funding source for the transportation improvements
 - Right-of-way dedication and acquisition
 - Construction of public street
 - Roundabouts at interchange

- □ Hi-Mast lighting at interchange of US Highway 52 at Hickory Tree Road
- □ Sewer extension
- Begin work on Town Park
- □ Town Hall
